

# WheatBread Sued by Animal Lovers Group

*Clark's most popular publication accused of sexual discrimination*

An article published last month in WheatBread, the shockingly brilliant new Clark magazine, has sparked a controversy on campus. The article in question was a review of "adult" shops in the Worcester area. Some students felt that the author unfairly characterized the lifestyle of animal lovers.

Heywood Jablomi, president of the Clark University Bestiality Society (CUBS) was outraged by the article. "The author clearly mocks our sexual preference," he stated while preparing a tasty dinner of chicken pot pie and asparagus for himself and his sheep. "She ignored the serious issues and instead

A protest rally has been planned for Tuesday afternoon.

Clark President Richard Traina, a very tall man, has stated that he will attend the rally.

CUBS has been circulating a petition demanding that the WheatBread author apologize publicly for her insensitivity and that all her pets be donated to the organization as punishment. # Grind Central Stolen from University Center

On Monday, April 1st, Campus Police Chief Stephen Goulet confirmed the baffling rumors that Grind Central had indeed been stolen from Clark. At press time, details were just becoming clear as to just how the thieves wrested the once thriving coffeehouse from the basement of the University Center.

ing to become the first Sponsorship University," the statement continued.

Traina's open letter to the community elaborated on this idea: "The Trustees and I agree that, while naming buildings after private benefactors is a grand and glorious tradition, it is simply not paying the bills. Instead, are going to open the campus buildings up to corporate bidders. This may result in an awkward transitional phase, but we believe the campus will get over it in four years or less. Besides, doesn't the 'Doritos Academic Center' have a ring to it? We like to think so."

The five stage plan also contains a stage two. "Stage two involves our new initiatives towards recruiting, some of which are already in place. The University feels that we need to draw people here in large quantities, and keep them here as long as possible. People who are not enrolled at Clark do not have to pay Clark, and this is why the Dean of Admissions is now the second highest-paid administrator. In conjunction with the Dean of the College, we are making all incoming students sign a waiver agreeing to owe Clark University the sum of four years' worth of tuition here, whether they transfer, drop out, or die."

Traina's press release also said, "Stage three seems to be our most controversial one: we are making all sophomores live on campus, be on a meal plan, and wear propellers on their

heads. There has been some discussion with Student Council, but they have agreed to make some perfunctory complaints, and then shut up about it. We believe the economic and moral integrity of the University will be strengthened by this."

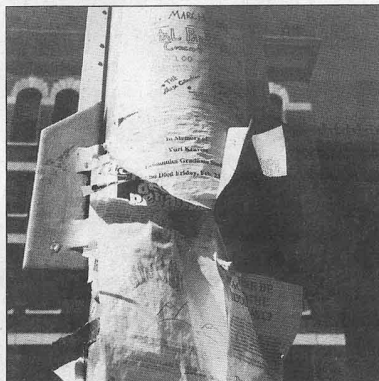
Furthermore, the letter went on, "Stage Four, in conjunction with the University Budgets of 1993-1997, consists of making a concerted effort to only admit people whose families make \$75,000 per year and up. We are hoping to attract many more princes and princesses from the Middle East and Asian subcontinent. Currently, the Admissions House is printing brochures in Arabic, Hebrew, Sanskrit, Parci, Mandarin and Hindi."

"Lastly," said the statement, "Our final stage is also the final stage of the University Park Project. The Main South Community Development Corporation, one of Clark's corporate assets, will help the University construct a wall around the school. We'll paint the inside so it looks like Levittown, New Jersey, or Kennedy Airport—whichever makes people feel more like home."

The closing of the statement went like this: "We feel that this plan would more than take advantage of existing conditions here on campus, and greatly increase the value of our stockholders' portfolios. Thank you."

The statement was distributed to all members of the Clark community.
