Bard, Macalster, Reed, Lewis & Clark, and arch rival ITT Technical Institute.

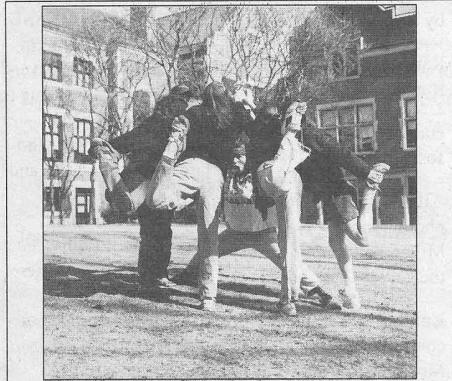
